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Museum Schnütgen Rautenstrauch-loest Museum – Cultures of the World

For five years, the Rautenstrauch-Joest Museum and the Museum Schnütgen have been next-door neighbours in the Cultural Quarter at Neumarkt. To mark this occasion, the two institutions are inviting the public to a joint special presentation.

On 22 October 2010, the Rautenstrauch-Joest Museum opened its new building and the Museum Schnütgen an extension in the heart of Cologne. Since then, in addition to the address and the spacious fover with all the service facilities, both institutions have shared a central entrance area with the Volkshochschule (community college) and the Museumsdienst Köln (Museums Service) of the City of Cologne. Since the opening on Cäcilienstrasse, the staffs of both museums have been developing ideas as to how they relate the collections - which are so different at first glance – in terms of a theme, maybe even making them jointly open to the public.

Possible cooperation projects initially had to be put on hold in favour of individual exhibitions of the respective institutions.

However, now time has come. We present "Madonna" meets Uma"! To mark the anniversary, valuable works from the Museum Schnütgen are visiting their neighbours in the Rautenstrauch-Joest Museum – and vice versa. In each case, one work of art from mediaeval Europe and one from an non-European culture form a pair that is combined under a common theme. In unusual. often surprising juxtapositions, these pairs encourage discussion of their content or formal aesthetics. Sometimes the focus is on similarities between cultural concepts – such as beauty ideals or notions of power – and their artistic translation. At other times, materials - such as gold and silver, millefiori beads or coconut testify to different appreciations and attributions. However, what unites all of them is the transformation of these cultural concepts as well as their reception over the course of history.

Look forward with us to the encounters of outstanding works of art from mediaeval Europe with such from Africa, the Americas, Asia and Oceania!
